### 11. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year (maximum five bullets)

- 1. To combat the growing trend of student apathy in taking up basic science as a field of study, IQAC had urged the science departments to form a science club for the promotion and popularization of basic science through creation of popular videos, posters, magazines etc. on scientific personalities and discoveries etc. A science club was successfully set up with 7 science departments and several such activities have been initiated.
- 2. To raise a body of students aware of their community and social responsibilities, IQAC urged the NSS body of the college to take up several activities like slum adaptation, health and literacy awareness programs etc. in the immediate locality of the college. All these activities have been executed by a dedicated NSS team.
- 3. IQAC organized several seminars on topics like 'Cyber crime' (12th September, 2022) and 'NAAC and AQAR preparation' (11th January, 2023) to enlighten the teaching faculty of the college to such topical issues. Along with these several seminars on academic interest were also conducted by the departments in collaboration with IQAC.
- 4. IQAC encouraged the administration to sign MOU's with different

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academic institutions and organizations to collaborate and share expertise and knowledge on various academic, social and administrative issues. Many such MOU's have been already been signed and related work started.

5. IQAC encouraged the departments to organize several value added/add on courses with the aim of imparting additional skills to students for accessing higher educational facilities and maneuvering the job market.

### 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

- Barasat Govt. College is an affiliated college under the academic jurisdiction of West Bengal State University (WBSU). It has no autonomy in designing the curricula and syllabus of it's undergraduate classes. However, all 13 departments of the institute offers several skill enhancement courses as well as 16 different value added / add on courses to all honors and general students across the board. Students are encouraged to take up topics of disciplines other than their subject of study to enhance their comprehensive knowledge base and add to their skills of interconnecting diverse ideas and concepts.
- IQAC with the help of the faculty members of the institute has taken up the task of identifying the parts of the syllabus of UG hons and PG courses which are multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary in nature. Several topics from the existing syllabus of different disciplines have been found to overlap with each other. For instance, "Human Right" is a common topic of both History and Philosophy syllabus, "Ecology and environmental biology" are common to both Botany and Zoology whereas, "Biochemistry" is taught in Botany, Zoology & Chemistry classes. Similarly "Rigid Dynamics" & "Mechanics" are the common topics of Physics & Mathematics syllabus. The aim of this move, is to arrange future classes of combined pool of teachers and students across disciplines to encourage lateral thinking and exchange of ideas.
- Computer courses (through DOEACC) and Environmental studies are courses offered by the institute to all student of both humanities and science stream to enhance their computing skills and eco-awareness so as to emerge as competent future citizens of the country.
- The college offers several general elective subjects to Honors students which cut across the divide of science and humanities. The students of Bengali, English, History, Philosophy, Political Science and Sanskrit Honors are offered GE courses in Science subjects like Geography and Economics. Students of Geography and Economics Honors can take up Arts subjects like History, Political Science and English as their GE course.
- Other than that newly admitted students under NEP take up

multidisciplinary courses on subjects not encountered in their courses taught so far.

### 16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The ABC system appears very impressive, lucid and is highly appreciated for academic career of the students. It gives the liberty to the students to build their career in a positive stance despite of hinderances in real - time (For instance, the process of Migration form one Univerty to another, etc.). With reference to the framework of NEP, ABC can only be realised in case of institues possessing Academic Autonomy. However, in order to introduce ABC in Colleges and Institutes having the status of affiliation under Autonomous Institutes (Universities or National Organisations, etc.) such a system needs to be redifined. In addition, government systems like - The Dept of Higher Education, Govt of West Bengal is yet to accept and thereby implement upon the ABC scheme. In regard to this aspect, our College is yet to get enrolled for Academic bank of credits (ABC).

### 17.Skill development:

- The institution has offered several value added courses to the students (both Hons. and Pass) in the academic year 2022 -23. Courses entitled Quick maths (Department of Mathematics), Water polluion and analysis (Department of Chemistry), Practical Guide Course on Human Blood Cell Count, Hemoglobin Estimation and Interpretation of Diseases (Zoology), Field survey and field resarch techniques (Geography), Collection, Preservation, Display & Cataloging of Museum Specimens (Zoology) Applied Statistics and Econometrics (Economics) Individual: Rights & Laws (Indian Context) (Poloitical Science), Biodiversity Conservations and Plant Resource Utilization (Botany) etc. have provided hands on training to students necessary for the competitive job market.
- College currently follows the CBCS and NEP 2020 syllabus of West Bengal State University which includes skill development courses under 11 disciplines.
- The college ha signed a MoU with several organizations like Data Q, IIARI etc. which can provide training in soft skills and computers to students.
- A faculty exchange program with atleast 13 colleges have been started to provide students with a chance of gaining know how and knowledge from sources outside the college premises.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The institution has offered several value added courses to the students (both Hons. and Pass) in the academic year 2022 -23.

- Courses entitled Cultural Heritge of India ( Department of History), Beyond Litrary Texts( Department of English), Banglir Henshel (Department of Bengali), Performing Arts in Sanskrit ( Department of Sanskrit) have course content pertaing to Indian cultural and linguistic heritage. There were enthusiastic participation of students across all disciplines in these courses which discussed topics as diversee as local cuisine, performing art forms, literary text, architectural heritage of the indian subcontinent.
- Several courses on Yoga as a tool of physical and emotional health has been organised both a value added course as well as a NSS initiative, to make students aware of the the rich philosophical heritage of india.

### 19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

- Barasat Govt. College runs sixteen UG programs and four PG programs. Each of these programs have definite program specific course outcomes that have been defined by the institute and displayed in the college website.
- All UG programs are conducted under the academic guidance of affiliated University (West Bengal State University), while the PG programs have academic autonomy in designing their curricula.
- As per CBCS and NEP course structure, the method of evaluation of student's performances of each course includes an internal assessment part, which is an excellent tool to evaluate the student's performances on a regular basis. Internal assessment tests assess whether the students achieve the desired course outcome or not. The record of awarded marks of internal assessment of all programs indicates that most of the students of this institution are performing well and attain the desired level of course outcome.
- Furthermore, the End semester result analysis shows that almost 90% students from both UG (exam designed by the affiliate university) and PG courses (exam designed by the college) have achieved more than 60% marks. This performance indicates that the desired course outcomes have been successfully achieved.
- Moreover, approximately 30% of the students of our institution have progressed to higher studies by successfully competing in all India entrance exams like JAM, NET, CUCET etc. further proving the realization of the course outcomes.

### **20.Distance education/online education:**

Our institution is an affiliated UG/PG college under West Bengal State University (WBSU). The institute has approval for conduct of only regular full-time off-line courses under the University (WBSU). However, the institute offers as a Study - Center for State level open university course (Netaji Subhas Open University NSOU) at the under-graduate level for B.A & B. Sc courses. This study center is particularly helpful to the remote rural area students. Thus, NSOU offers the students the facility to conduct such distance education.

The process of curriculum delivery practiced by the institution is meticulously crafted and prudently executed from the beginning of the academic session. The guidelines laid down by its parent university (WBSU) are sincerely followed all along, not just by keeping to the syllabus but also through continuous communication

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with members of Boards of Studies as well as the officials. Several teachers of this institutionare involved in the university's evaluation process as examiners, question-paper-setters, moderators, invigilators. In addition to these, the college has always also been a favoured centre for the university's practical examinations.

The college does its best to provide a congenial atmosphere for the teaching-learning process. The teachers are encouraged to present their best face to the students and play the role of their friend, philosopher and guide. The interest of the students reigns supreme in the minds of the faculty and administration. As a direct consequence of this the teachers, apart from making themselves available in physical classrooms through the chalk-and-talk avatar, also make use of ICT enabled resources like computers, projectors, smart classrooms and the internet. Online teaching also taken recourse to whenever needed, to supplement offline teaching. Invited lectures and seminarsare frequently organized to give the best possible academic exposure to the students.

The departments preserve examination answer-scripts, projects, presentations and geo-tagged photographs as part of the documentation. Notices are published in the general notice book, notice-boards and the college website to inform all stake-holders about any event.

# 1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Our institution strongly believes in a holistic approach to knowledge. The different disciplines in our education system shape and focus the students' pursuit of knowledge. But we believe that in addition to this a healthy interaction between diverse disciplines, if in place, serves to enrich their individual scopes and provide the students with a nuanced exposure of their vistas. Integrating crosscutting issues within higher education, therefore, is an obvious method adopted by us.

A key agent of these endeavours is the National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of the college. In 2022 - 23 it organized several awareness and sensitization programmes on issues relating to the environment, health matters, social concerns, equal opportunities for specially abled people, gender, sports and yoga. It also organized blood donation camps involving all stakeholders of the institution. An emagazine was also published by this unit.

Most of the academic departments of the college successfully organized gender sensitization workshops in association with the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) of the college. International Women's Day was also observed by the NSS unit of the college whereas the ICC observed Women's History Month in March 2023. The Psychological Counselling Cell of the college satisfactorily conducted counselling of several students with full privacy and anonymity. The Department of Geography organized a special mentoring programme for its students. The DATA-Q, NEILIT Accredited Centre & CSC Academy housed within the college campus held a Spoken English and a Computer course which were open to all students of the college.

### 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Barasat Government College assesses the levels of learning and knowledge gathered by the students on a regular basis using various methods such as frequent class tests (written and viva-voce), university prescribed internal examinations, university organized end-semester examinations, assignments, project preparation, presentations etc.

Most of the departments organized sufficient remedial/tutorial classes for slow-learners along with their regular scheduled classes where students were able to interact directly with the respective teachers for clearing their doubts. For advanced-learners, advanced-level lectures, several seminars, different outreach-programs beyond the curriculum were made accessible. Moreover, there were several efforts to provide lecture and content related study materials to the students through the College Website, WhatsApp-Groups, photocopies in offline-classes and links for consulting e-resources.

Different seminars on emerging issues have been organised by the departments on a regular basis. Most of the departments published students' magazines, several departments also published online magazines on different occasions containing contributions from students.

Each of the departments has observed subject related "Commemorative-Days" through seminars, poster competition and other cultural-programs. This has served to help students enhance their knowledge regarding the larger world beyond the confinement of curriculum, to remember and commemorate past important events and to celebrate culture, nature andworld heritage.

This year different departments of Barasat Government College organized altogether 17-value-added/add-on courses mostly during the summer recess. Value-added/add-on programs can help students apply their theoretical knowledge to real-world scenarios and challenges, to discover and pursue their interests and passions beyond their regular curriculum.

### 2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Barasat Government College practices various student-centricmethods, such as experiential-learning, participative learning, and problem-solving methodologies for enriching the learning experiences of the students. All departments conduct weekly-tests/internalassessments to assess the progress of students. Departments also provide platforms to students for participative learning through projects, presentations, webinars, wall magazines, E-magazine and film screenings.

Fieldwork and excursions which were conducted to inculcate among the

students the practice and habit of participative learning and problem solving is a regular practice of science departments such as Zoology, Botany and Geography. But in this academic session several arts departments such as English, Political science,
History, Sanskrit, Philosophy have also organised fieldvisit/excursion on several important places. These visits also offer several other benefits to students such as improving participative learning, exposure to different cultures, gathering geographical knowledge. In addition to enhancing academic performance students are being encouraged in online teaching-learning methods (like Google-classroom/google/Jamboard/YouTube).

In order to enhance experiential and participative-learning skill of students, in the academic session of 2022-23 our college has taken two innovative and significant projects-Students of seven of our science

departmentsZoology,Botany,Mathematics,Physics,Chemistry,Economicsand Geography have successfully formed a science-club "SCIENTIA ' with the objective of nurturing creative activities of students all along the year. They have created video presentations on different scientific events and issues. There will be writings and posters celebrating different important occasions and issueswill upload these contents to our college you tube channel, will organise a VDO-shows to present their creative contents.

Smart Classroom of Department of Zoology is regularly used for teaching learning purposes.

Department of Mathematics has a well-equipped computer lab, partially shared by the Department of Economics for guiding students to use economic software and project preparation. Department of Geography has a GIS lab running successfully by the teachers and students of the department.

The Department of Physics and Botany also carry out the practice of taking the teaching learning process to new levels with the use of Google Classroom software.

Under West Bengal State University, Barasat Government College is an affiliated college. At present we have 13-UG departments and 4-PG departments. All UG programmes and course outcomes are, therefore, part of the University curriculum. The programme of study offered by each department and learning outcomes of all UG courses are clearly displayed on the college website which can be accessed by all the stakeholders. Moreover, hardcopies of the syllabi are available from central library and from respective departments. Hardcopies of the course/programme outcomes are available with the respective departments as ready reference for the teachers and students. The syllabus of each programme provides clear and detailed information about core-courses, generic elective courses and discipline specific courses and skill enhancement course. The learning-outcomes of different programmes also include instructions regarding evaluation. Some of our eminent teachers act as members of boards of studies of the parent university and thereby contribute to syllabus construction of UG programmes.

Presently our college offers four post-graduate programmes in the following subjects - Physics, Botany, Zoology and Bengali. CBCS course model has been implemented in the PG Departments of Zoology, Botany and Bengali from Session 2019-20, whereas PG Dept of Physics implemented the CBCS model in 2021-22. All postgraduate departments have been given academic autonomy and the PG courses offered by the departments are designed accordingly, maintaining coordination with the parent university. Although their syllabus is designed autonomously, their boards of studies have teacher member from respective PG department of parent university.

Every department organized parent- teacher meetings during every semester where detailed discussions were held between parents and teachers. There is the provision of result consideration meeting of each department where an in- depth analytical discussion on outcomes were regularly held to monitor students' performance and to detect the critical perspective of teaching learning process as well as its outcomes.

The Academic audit committee of the college comprising of senior teachers of the college and twoexternal members (Zoology Professor of WBSU & Principal, Barasat College) conducts an internal academic audit annually regarding overall progress of the students -- results, attendance, students' assignments, extra-curricular performances, grievances etc. for each department of the college and prepare a comprehensive Academic Audit Report, that has been uploaded on the college website.

Moreover, analyzing the End semesters results (UG & PG), it is found that (1) approx 80% of UG students acquiring more than 6 (CGPA) (2) approx 50% of PG students acquiring more than 6 (CGPA). This performance of students indicates that the outcomes of the courses have been attained successfully.

### 3.2 - Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 - Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Post Graduate students of Zoology visited Vivekananda Institute of Biotechnology, Ramakrishna Mission Ashram, Nimpith, South 24 Parganas on 10.04.2023 for studying the bio-fertilizer technology, horticultural biotechnology, plant tissue culture, mushroom technology, bioenergy, vermicomposting process. M.Sc. Semester-IV zoology students along with teachers visited Immunology Lab and Genetics lab, Department of Zoology, University of Calcutta on 26.04.2023 and found different advanced lab techniques like Centrifugation, PCR, SDS-PAGE, Agarose gel electrophoresis, FACS, Cell culture facilities and Histopathological analysis of tissues. It helped in developing their soft skills, research ideas and helped to discover potential new analyses and perspectives to research work.

Hands on training of cultivation of the mushroom specially oyster mushroom were conducted in Department of Botany which not only helpful to overcome the malnutrition problem but also augment the livelihood of the beneficiaries. Department of Botany is maintaining a small herbal garden with several medicinal plants. It was established to familiarize the students with the common plants that can help us in our everyday life to cure some common ailments and also in some emergency like cut and burn. Some of the common medicinal plants that we maintain in our garden are Andrographis paniculate, Andrographis paniculate, Cynodon dactylon, Aloe vera, Datura stramonium, Curcuma longa, Zingiber officinale, Hibiscus rosasinensis, Hygrophila spinose etc. With the interest growing on herbal medicines, we can reduce our unnecessary consumption of commercial medicines for many common health troubles.

#### 6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 - The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

Barasat Government College is situated within a large rural hinterland and is very well connected by both rail and road. The College offers both, UG and PG courses as per regulations from Higher Education Department and the University (WBSU). The aim of the college is to provide holistic education and opportunities to students from diverse backgrounds and capabilities. It thus formulates policies to encourage students from economically and socially marginalized communities. It also boosts the enrolment of girl students in higher education.

The Teachers council of the college has set up several committees constituted of teaching members and support staff to pursue these aims.

An admission committee constituted by the Teachers council works to make the admission process transparent and regulates the process so that reservation policies of the state and central government are adhered to.

A students welfare and support cell also works in tandem with the departments to oversee that students belonging to economically weaker section of society gets the benefit of various scholarship schemes to pursue their studies. In this regard, a Student Scholarship Cell for the institution was essentially required and

for the purpose a room was identified and assigned in the Main Building of the institution.

An active gender cell along with the ICC has been instrumental in taking up several gender sensitization programs and making the campus safe and comfortable for women. This is reflected in the rising number of girls in the student community of the college over the years.

#### 6.5 - Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 - Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

IQAC plays a significant role in both the academic and administrative developments of the college.:

1. IQAC initiated an internal academic audit of all thirteen departments of the college, taking into account several aspects like student attendance, academic performance and progression, research

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publication, webinars organized, student activities (magazines, seminars etc.), as well as infrastructural facilities of the departments. It also collects feedbacks from all stakeholders of the college. All the report are analyzed by both internal and external members of the audit team and IQAC, the strengths and weaknesses identified and suitable steps formulated with the departmental heads to address the problem areas.

- 2. To combat the growing trend of student apathy in taking up basic science as a field of study, IQAC had urged the science departments to form a science club for the promotion and popularization of basic science through creation of popular videos, posters, magazines etc. on scientific personalities and discoveries etc. A science club was successfully set up with 7 science departments and several such activities have been initiated.
- 3. To raise a body of students aware of their community and social responsibilities, IQAC urged the NSS body of the college to take up several activities like slum adaptation, health and literacy awareness programs etc. in the immediate locality of the college. All these activities have been executed by a dedicated NSS team.

Hazardous chemicals waste management: To reduce the volume of chemical waste generated in the laboratories the following initiatives have been taken: a) Purchase of minimum possible quantity of hazardous chemicals required for our laboratories. b) Sharing surplus chemicals with other laboratories of biological sciences. c) Practicing green chemistry i.e. substituting hazardous chemicals with nonhazardous chemicals whenever possible. d) Reducing the scale of laboratory experiments to reduce the volume of wastes being produced . e) Specially constructed Waste Accumulation Area (WAA) outside the Department of Chemistry to dispose the liquid waste, produced from the experiments conducted through pipelines to the WAA.E-waste management: The College comes under the purview of West Bengal state government and hence cannot independently dispose of e-waste without the permission and intervention of the government authorities. It has been resolved that the e-waste of the college will be disposed through Webel Technology Limited and departments have been asked to prepare a list of the e waste items lying in the respective departments. As per guidelines of Higher Education Department a committee of e-waste management has been formed comprising of 5 associate professors and one assistant professor. The team has met with members of the DM office to finalize the process of e waste disposal.

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#### 200 words

Barasat Government College, aim since the time of inception has been to impart holistic education to the children of this semi-urban area as well as the vast rural hinterland to which it is connected by road and rail. The admission is conducted online strictly as per government regulations, so the college caters to both general and socially and economically marginalized students, including the students from the minority communities. However, we have noticed a very encouraging trend in the rise in the number of the girl students over the years. The % of girls students admitted to the college is ~58.5% of the total admitted students. Following this trend we have given greater attention to the needs of our girl students, besides offering them scholarships, we also have a gender cell that works in tandem with the strong ICC cell, and addresses issues pertaining to gender sensitization. There are seminars, film shows, online magazine publication and workshops for the students to promote the same. The NSS also joined force and organized several women centric programs, especially addressing issues of gender sensitization and empowerment. Alongside this, we have a psychological counselling cell with a qualified student counsellor, which works constantly through group programs and one to-one counselling to ensure good mental health of the young youth. Our aim is to raise a student body of modern youths confident and aware of their gender status.

Our institution strongly believes in a holistic approach to knowledge. The different disciplines in our education system

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shape and focus the students' pursuit of knowledge. But we believe that in addition to this a healthy interaction between diverse disciplines, if in place, serves to enrich their individual scopes and provide the students with a nuanced exposure of their vistas. Integrating crosscutting issues within higher education, therefore, is an obvious method adopted by us.

A key agent of these endeavours is the National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of the college. #### 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Barasat Government College assesses the levels of learning and knowledge gathered by the students on a regular basis using

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various methods such as frequent class tests (written and vivavoce), university prescribed internal examinations, university organized end-semester examinations, assignments, project preparation, presentations etc.

Most of the departments organized sufficient remedial/tutorial classes for slow-learners along with their regular scheduled classes where students were able to interact directly with the respective teachers for clearing their doubts. For advanced-learners, advanced-level lectures, several seminars, different outreach-programs beyond the curriculum were made accessible. Moreover, there were several efforts to provide lecture and content related study materials to the students through the College Website, WhatsApp-Groups, photocopies in offline-classes and links for consulting e-resources.

Different seminars on emerging issues have been organised by the departments on a regular basis. Most of the departments published students' magazines, several departments also published online magazines on different occasions containing contributions from students.

Each of the departments has observed subject related "Commemorative-Days" through seminars, poster competition and other cultural-programs. This has served to help students enhance their knowledge regarding the larger world beyond the confinement of curriculum, to remember and commemorate past important events and to celebrate culture, nature andworld heritage.

This year different departments of Barasat Government College organized altogether 17-value-added/add-on courses mostly during the summer recess. Value-added/add-on programs can help students apply their theoretical knowledge to real-world scenarios and challenges, to discover and pursue their interests and passions beyond their regular curriculum.

Barasat Government College practices various student-centricmethods, such as experiential-learning, participative learning, and problem-solving methodologies for enriching the learning experiences of the students. All departments conduct weeklytests/internal-assessments to assess the progress of students. Departments also provide platforms to students for participative learning through projects, presentations, webinars, wall magazines, E-magazine and film screenings.

Fieldwork and excursions which were conducted to inculcate among the students the practice and habit of participative learning and problem solving is a regular practice of science departments such as Zoology, Botany and Geography. But in this academic session several arts departments such as English, Political science, History, Sanskrit, Philosophy have also organised field-visit/excursion on several important places. These visits also offer several other benefits to students such as improving participative learning, exposure to different cultures, gathering geographical knowledge. In addition to enhancing academic performance students are being encouraged in online teaching-learning methods (like Google-classroom/google/Jamboard/YouTube).

In order to enhance experiential and participative-learning skill of students, in the academic session of 2022-23 our college has taken two innovative and significant projects-Students of seven of our science departmentsZoology,Botany,Mathematics,Physics,Chem istry,Economicsand Geography have successfully formed a science-club "SCIENTIA ' with the objective of nurturing creative activities of students all along the year. They have created video presentations on different scientific events and issues. Extreme care is exercised to ensure that all grievances are solved within minimum possible time period so that future of the students remained unaffected. After

the evaluation the students are shown the evaluated answer scripts to initiate a discussion on the individual academic performance.

The Academic Audit Committee conducts an internal audit annually to address any grievances related to conducting examinations and files a report accordingly. In addition to this, the analysis of feedback from students and parents also has a positive contribution to the redressal of such grievances.

Under West Bengal State University, Barasat Government College is an affiliated college. At present we have 13-UG departments and 4-PG departments. All UG programmes and course outcomes are, therefore, part of the University curriculum. The programme of study offered by each department and learning outcomes of all UG courses are clearly displayed on the college website which can be accessed by all the stakeholders. Moreover, hardcopies of the syllabi are available from central library and from respective departments. Hardcopies of the course/programme outcomes are available with the respective departments as ready reference for the teachers and students. The syllabus of each programme provides clear and detailed information about core-courses, generic elective courses and discipline specific courses and skill enhancement course. The learning-outcomes of different programmes also include instructions regarding evaluation. Some of our eminent teachers act as members of boards of studies of the parent university and thereby contribute to syllabus construction of UG programmes.

Presently our college offers four post-graduate programmes in the following subjects - Physics, Botany, Zoology and Bengali. CBCS course model has been implemented in the PG Departments of Zoology, Botany and Bengali from Session 2019-20, whereas PG Dept of Physics implemented the CBCS model in 2021-22. All

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postgraduate departments have been given academic autonomy and the PG courses offered by the departments are designed accordingly, maintaining coordination with the parent university. Although their syllabus is designed autonomously, their boards of studies have teacher member from respective PG department of parent university.

All programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes and course outcomes have been regularly evaluated during the year through internal exams, end-semester exams, assignment, presentations, viva-voce exams and others. Evaluation of program outcome and course outcome were also be achieved through feedback collected from all stakeholders i.e. from the students, the parents, the teachers, and the alumni. Every department organized parent-teacher meetings during every semester where detailed discussions were held between parents and teachers. There is the provision of result consideration meeting of each department where an indepth analytical discussion on outcomes were regularly held to monitor students' performance and to detect the critical perspective of teaching learning process as well as its outcomes.

The Academic audit committee of the college comprising of senior teachers of the college and twoexternal members (Zoology Professor of WBSU & Principal, Barasat College) conducts an internal academic audit annually regarding overall progress of the students -- results, attendance, students' assignments, extracurricular performances, grievances etc. for each department of the college and prepare a comprehensive Academic Audit Report, that has been uploaded on the college website.

Moreover, analyzing the End semesters results (UG & PG), it is found that (1) approx 80% of UG students acquiring more than 6 (CGPA) (2) approx 50% of PG students acquiring more than 6 (CGPA). This performance of students indicates that the outcomes

Post Graduate students of Zoology visited Vivekananda Institute of Biotechnology, Ramakrishna Mission Ashram, Nimpith, South 24

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Parganas on 10.04.2023 for studying the bio-fertilizer technology, horticultural biotechnology, plant tissue culture, mushroom technology, bioenergy, vermicomposting process. M.Sc. Semester-IV zoology students along with teachers visited Immunology Lab and Genetics lab, Department of Zoology, University of Calcutta on 26.04.2023 and found different advanced lab techniques like Centrifugation, PCR, SDS-PAGE, Agarose gel electrophoresis, FACS, Cell culture facilities and Histopathological analysis of tissues. It helped in developing their soft skills, research ideas and helped to discover potential new analyses and perspectives to research work.

Hands on training of cultivation of the mushroom specially oyster mushroom were conducted in Department of Botany which not only helpful to overcome the malnutrition problem but also augment the livelihood of the beneficiaries. Department of Botany is maintaining a small herbal garden with several medicinal plants. It was established to familiarize the students with the common plants that can help us in our everyday life to cure some common ailments and also in some emergency like cut and burn. Some of the common medicinal plants that we maintain in our garden are Andrographis paniculate, Andrographis paniculate, Cynodon dactylon, Aloe vera, Datura stramonium, Curcuma longa, Zingiber officinale, Hibiscus rosa-sinensis, Hygrophila spinose etc. With the interest growing on herbal medicines, we can reduce our unnecessary consumption of commercial medicines for many common health troubles.

### 6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 - The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

Barasat Government College is situated within a large rural hinterland and is very well connected by both rail and road. The College offers both, UG and PG courses as per regulations from Higher Education Department and the University (WBSU). The aim of the college is to provide holistic education and opportunities to students from diverse backgrounds and capabilities. It thus formulates policies to encourage students from economically and socially marginalized communities. It also boosts the enrolment of girl students in higher education.

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The Teachers council of the college has set up several committees constituted of teaching members and support staff to pursue these aims.

An admission committee constituted by the Teachers council works to make the admission process transparent and regulates the process so that reservation policies of the state and central government are adhered to.

A students welfare and support cell also works in tandem with the departments to oversee that students belonging to economically weaker section of society gets the benefit of various scholarship schemes to pursue their studies. In this regard, a Student Scholarship Cell for the institution was essentially required and for the purpose a room was identified and assigned in the Main Building of the institution.

An active gender cell along with the ICC has been instrumental in taking up several gender sensitization programs and making the campus safe and comfortable for women. This is reflected in the rising number of girls in the student community of the college over the years.

The functioning of the college has been categorized into several heads like (i) Student related (2) Faculty related (3) Infrastructural Development and (4) Financial management.

The teachers council of the college has constituted several committees under these heads to act in collaboration with the office staff for smooth functioning of the institution .

IQAC plays a significant role in both the academic and administrative developments of the college.:

- 1. IQAC initiated an internal academic audit of all thirteen departments of the college, taking into account several aspects like student attendance, academic performance and progression, research publication, webinars organized, student activities (magazines, seminars etc.), as well as infrastructural facilities of the departments. It also collects feedbacks from all stakeholders of the college. All the report are analyzed by both internal and external members of the audit team and IQAC, the strengths and weaknesses identified and suitable steps formulated with the departmental heads to address the problem areas.
- 2. To combat the growing trend of student apathy in taking up basic science as a field of study, IQAC had urged the science departments to form a science club for the promotion and popularization of basic science through creation of popular videos, posters, magazines etc. on scientific personalities and discoveries etc. A science club was successfully set up with 7 science departments and several such activities have been initiated.
- 3. To raise a body of students aware of their community and social responsibilities, IQAC urged the NSS body of the college to take up several activities like slum adaptation, health and literacy awareness programs etc. in the immediate locality of the college. All these activities have been executed by a dedicated

NSS team.

Solid Waste management: Dismantled building materials, bio degradable waste from the canteen and paper waste are collected in the Vat for clearance by the local municipality at regular intervals. Hazardous chemicals waste management: To reduce the volume of chemical waste generated in the laboratories the following initiatives have been taken: a) Purchase of minimum possible quantity of hazardous chemicals required for our laboratories. b) Sharing surplus chemicals with other laboratories of biological sciences. c) Practicing green chemistry i.e. substituting hazardous chemicals with nonhazardous chemicals whenever possible. d) Reducing the scale of laboratory experiments to reduce the volume of wastes being produced . e) Specially constructed Waste Accumulation Area (WAA) outside the Department of Chemistry to dispose the liquid waste, produced from the experiments conducted through pipelines to the WAA.Ewaste management: The College comes under the purview of West Bengal state government and hence cannot independently dispose of e-waste without the permission and intervention of the government authorities. It has been resolved that the e-waste of the college will be disposed through Webel Technology Limited and departments have been asked to prepare a list of the e waste items lying in the respective departments. As per guidelines of Higher Education Department a committee of e-waste management has been formed comprising of 5 associate professors and one assistant professor. #### 7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 - Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 200 words

Barasat Government College, aim since the time of inception has been to impart holistic education to the children of this semiurban area as well as the vast rural hinterland to which it is connected by road and rail. The admission is conducted online strictly as per government regulations, so the college caters to both general and socially and economically marginalized students, including the students from the minority communities. However, we have noticed a very encouraging trend in the rise in the number of the girl students over the years. The % of girls students admitted to the college is ~58.5% of the total admitted students. Following this trend we have given greater attention to the needs of our girl students, besides offering them scholarships, we also have a gender cell that works in tandem with the strong ICC cell, and addresses issues pertaining to gender sensitization. There are seminars, film shows, online magazine publication and workshops for the students to promote the same. The NSS also joined force and organized several women centric programs, especially addressing issues of gender sensitization and empowerment. Alongside this, we have a psychological counselling cell with a qualified student counsellor, which works constantly through group programs and one to-one counselling to ensure good mental health of the young youth. Our aim is to raise a student body of modern youths confident and aware of their gender status.
