- An Environment Protection and Nature cell is formed. Dr. Manju Mondal, Associate Professor of Bengali, a noted nature lover is convenor of the committee. The committee instils awareness among the youngsters through day to day actual practice and observance like conservation of water, energy (electricity), proper use of waste bins etc.
- Teachers of both Post Graduate and Under Graduate departments are involved in active research work which is reflected by a considerable number of major and minor

- The University team has inspected the Department of Chemistry and approved introduction of Post Graduate course in Chemistry.
- ➤ It is reported that Government has sanctioned two new departments in general course in Statistics and Physical Education.
- > Several career counselling programmes have been organised by the institution.
- ➤ Information literacy training programme for students is continued by DOEACC as per MOU.
- Following technology enabled facilities are available for effective teaching:

- Use of internet.
- Use of audio-visual medium like films.
- Several extension programmes are undertaken by NSS unit of the college. For example, the NSS unit of the College in collaboration with *Sappho for Equality*, Kolkata conducted a workshop on gender sensitization in February 2014.

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#### **Institutional Strength**

- > Barasat Government College enjoys an advantage location; situated at the district headquarter.
- The college believes in inclusive growth as well as quality assurances with equal opportunities for all students by arranging remedial classes for SC, ST, OBC and slow learners.
- ➤ Being a Government college, it earns the faith of the largest populace regarding academic quality, creating a positive and transparent environment.
- > Special care and assistance for students for economically weaker section through measures like nominal college-fee, number of scholarships, fee-waiver scheme etc.
- ➤ The college has recorded consistently good academic results. Many students have topped university merit list. Students' achievements in games and sports at the district/state level have brought glory to the college.
- > Social outreach initiatives through NSS have added to strength of the institution.
- ➤ Greater participation in research has improved substantially .Research projects and peer-reviewed publications both in national and international journals are testimony to the contribution of the institution in the higher academic field.

#### Institutional Weakness

- > Space constraint is one of the weaknesses of the college.
- The college has no large auditorium of its own
- > The college is yet to have its own hostel, though the students have been accommodated in other government hostels.
- The institute has to suffer shortage of manpower at times due to transfer policy of state government.
- It has limited scope for career placement in private sectors for all UG students.
- The occasional official requisition of college premises for commissioning and conducting Public Elections causes loss of teaching days and affects campus cleanliness.

#### Opportunities lying ahead of the Institution

- Further expansion of postgraduate courses will benefit the region as considerable demand exists for postgraduate studies.
- There is an agenda to introduce INFLIBNET in the library which will enable the students and staff of the college to access the E-resources.
- ➤ The success of the students in all-India level entrance examinations such as IIT, JAM, GATE, UGC-NET has increased. But there is scope of more improvement.
- ➤ Wi-Fi enabled campus will create a better connectivity among the stakeholders and will increase the academic output to a great extent.
- ➤ It has provision for adult and continuing education through NSOU.

#### Challenges

The academic performance of the students though good, yet there remains further scope for improvement. Given the annual increase in intake capacity, the challenge is to retain and enhance the quality performance. Smooth integration of all graduates of the institution in the job-market remains a challenge.

#### ANNEXURE – 3

#### **Best Practice-I**

#### **Title of the Practice: Protection of environment.**

The Institution holds environmental ethics in high regard and wishes to achieve through all its practices a holistic approach to the protection of environment.

#### **Objectives of the Practice**

The main aim is to encourage the young students to be aware and actively participate in actions connected with the conservation of nature and to make them aware of the ill effects of environmental exploitation and ecological imbalance.

#### **Context**

The perils of environmental degradation affect the life of human beings and increase the carbon footprint. Under the circumstances general awareness about nature is not sufficient, but extensive activities for ecological protection are needed. The college must play a role in generating environmental consciousness, involving the students and the local people.

#### **Intended Outcome**

- To create environmental awareness among the students and staff of the college.
- To provide consultancy service for the protection of nature in the surrounding areas.
- To create awareness about optimal usage of natural resources, like water, electricity, fuel.

#### **Practice**

- The institution involves the direct stakeholders in protecting the environment by practicing
  plantation of trees, optimal usage of electricity and water, restriction on usage of plastic,
  disposal of bio-waste through autoclave procedure, segregation of e-waste etc. within the
  campus.
- The Environment Protection and Nature Cell organized an awareness programme related to Safe handling / usage / savings of LPG domestic Gas on 19.08.2013. An interactive session and a Quiz Competition was also held after the programme.

#### **Evidence of Success**

- The DFO of the North 24 Parganas and a local NGO sought expert view to preserve old road side rain trees in the district. Professors led by the Head of the department of Botany gave the detailed report to the district authority in due course.
- Landscaped green cover within the campus area has increased as compared to earlier times.
- E-waste disposal mechanism has been incorporated through the condemnation committee.

#### Problems encountered and Resources required

 General consciousness about necessity of environmental protection is at a low level currently. Naturally, sustainable practices outside the campus suffer from lack of acceptance.

- Within the campus as well, certain intended outcomes require mobilization of funds. For example, processes like rain-water harvesting or rooftop solar panel requires considerable amount of funding.
- Alternative/green practices are often found to be expensive. To overcome this hurdle, holistic intervention at the policy level is necessary.

#### **Best Practice-II**

#### **Title of the Practice**

Improvement of stakeholders' relationship at the institutional Level

Stakeholders of the institution are students, parents, teaching and non-teaching staff, alumni and local society.

#### **Objectives of the Practice**

Continuous upgradation and standardization of system and infrastructure, efficient office management, enhancing teaching quality, maintenance of discipline, attendance, performance in academics, sports, cultural events, participation in co-curricular activities and institutional outreach programmes.

#### Context

Students from diverse social backgrounds take admission in this college, where a predominant focus remains on SC, minority and girl students. Apart from heterogeneity in financial backgrounds, some of them also are first generation learners. Naturally, it is imperative to take their parents into confidence about the larger objectives of institution and the students also require constant guidance and mentoring about future opportunities. There is necessity to develop community orientation among the students. The goodwill generated by the alumni of the institution needs to be tapped in properly in order to make further progress. Also the role of non-teaching staff should be conceived in a participative framework.

#### **Intended Outcome**

- Holistic development of the students as responsible future citizens.
- To garner interest among the alumni and the local society in improving and sustaining the quality of the institution.
- To incorporate the opinions of stakeholders, such as students and parents and staff, in the overall management of the institutional matters.

#### **Practice**

- Feedback from students on academic and infrastructural issues are collected and analysed on a regular basis.
- Community oriented outreach programmes are organized to inculcate the spirit of service among the students.
- Parent-teacher meetings are organized by individual departments. The feedback from the parents are also collected and analysed to improve the delivery of services.

- Opinion of alumni of the institution and members of the local society are incorporated in the day-to-day running of the institution.
- Congenial relation between college administration and the staff are maintained.

#### **Evidence of Success**

- Students' feedback have been utilized to augment infrastructural aspects of the College. Subsequent positive feedbacks on those parameters imply the satisfaction of the students.
- In parent-teacher meetings, the parents have generally expressed satisfaction on various parameters of the academic, co-curricular and infrastructural aspects of the institution.
- As part of community oriented outreach programme, the College in collaboration with Calcutta National Medical College organized kala-azar detection camps in 2013 and 2014 in endemic zones of West Bengal and adjoining Jharkhand state, for awareness of the local people and for detecting new pockets of Kala-azar, led by Dr. Madhumita Manna, Associate Professor of Zoology.

#### Problems encountered and Resources required

- At times, routine transfer of teachers result in shortage of manpower ideally desired for carrying out this relationship building exercise and the following up those.
- Experience shows that web-medium can be a useful tool to cater to the stakeholders virtually. However, a section of students and parents remain outside the scope of such medium due to the prevalent digital divide and financial disparity.
