The UG departments of the institution follow the syllabus and guidelines of the affiliating university. Several teachers are members of the Undergraduate Board of Studies, where they actively contribute in the university's curriculum forming process. The PG departments have academic autonomy. They frame their syllabus, with advice from subject experts, which are subsequently approved by the PG BOS. The PG syllabus is included in the PG prospectus. The Institution has upgraded itself to cope with the demands of the changing syllabi. It uses supports of smart classrooms, ICTs, audio-visual material available on the internet to make a successful implementation of the curriculum. Student

seminars and discussion sessions are organised to further the objective of improved communication of the syllabus. Resource persons are also invited to deliver talks and lectures. All activities of the institution are continually documented through photographs of the events, records of attendance in classes and extracurricular activities. These records are preserved by respective departments and committees. The departments also preserve projects and presentations as part of the documentation. Notices are published in the general notice book, notice board and the website to inform all stake-holders about an event. They also form a part of the documentation of an event/activity.

Feedback Obtained

1) Regular feedbacks are taken from students by the departments. The feedback is read by all the teachers of the department. Thereafter the feedback is centrally analysed and addressed (or redressed). 2) Teachers' council meetings must be regarded as a well documented feedback taking platform. Teachers both give and resolve issues in these meetings about every academic activity. 3) Since ours is a government institution, the institution submits regular reports to the government about all its activities and it functions according to government rules and instruction. The Government send its nominees and representatives to procure further information, if so required. 4) The college has a strong and effective alumnus. Some of the regular teachers being alumnimembers act as liaisonofficers exchanging information between the alumnus and the institution. 5) The departments also organise ParentTeacher meetings. These meetings are very effective platforms for teachers to give their feedbacks to the parents about their wards and the facilities that are enjoyed by students in this college. Various systems are in place for mentoring students in this institute. The majority of students of this institute come from lower middle class or economically poor households. Many of them are 1st generation learners with no academic environment at home. Keeping this backdrop in mind, the institute has devised a number of systems to cater for the academic and overall development of the student. Each department holds regular tutorial classes (at least 4 per week), remedial class for socially and economically vulnerable students after college hours. Initially the remedial classes were funded by UGC, but the college continued with the practice even when the funds were discontinued. A psychological counselling cell is functional in the college which regularly provides mental support to the students. It organises regular awareness programs and workshops aimed at personality development and gender sensitization. Student seminars are also organized to hone their speaking and presentation skills.

This college was set up, in the year 1950, aiming to impart quality education to the pupils for their allround development. As one of the leading colleges of the district, we do our best to ensure quality education. Owing to its geographical location in the communication network, ambiance, glorious records, remarkable results and achievements, the college attracts the best brains of the locality students from a wide area and from a varied socioeconomic background. A good number of

Following the ideals of inclusive education, we are committed to look after the needs of the larger society, including students from this disadvantaged class, who are meritorious but lack the means. So our mission is to prove that even a first generation learner can reach the heights if given proper opportunities, right facilities and guidance. With reference to the above table it is apparent that the ratio of female students in this college is very high and is steadily increasing over the years. Majority of them belong to financially as well as socially backward classes. A large section of them belong to Muslim minority group. Encouraging these students to pursue higher education and motivating them to continue with their studies braving social odds proves a challenge to the institution. A number of steps have been devised focussing on the female students of this college: (i) A variety of financial scholarships like Kanyashree (a state government scholarship), single girl child scholarship (central govt.), poor fund, half free and full free scholarships are provided to the students through the scholarship committee of the college. The college has temporarily recruited 2 staff members to provide assistance to the girl students regarding this matter. (ii) A strong ICC and gender cell, which addresses the various gender related issues, functions in the college. The committees regularly arrange gender sensitization programs to raise awareness on various social issues relating to women. (iii) A fully functional psychological counselling cell operates in the institute providing support and guidance to the female students.

8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

• The college plans to implement CBCS system as per university regulation and UGC recommendation from the next academic session in the undergraduate courses. IQAC recommends the formation of a CBCS implementation committee formed of faculty members and non teaching staff of the institute who will work in collaboration with the routine committee for smooth implementation of the new system. • A plan for the introduction of online student management system is underway. This webpage will provide a single portal for the students where their personal information, academic results (both university and internal assessment), attendance details, scholarship data etc. IQAC has suggested that a financial module be provided in the portal so that students can check their dues and make online payment of fees. It also should have an archival facility for storage of students registration certificates, admit cards, marksheets etc. • The existing solar panel has a very limited capability. Extension of this solar panel facility is being hindered due to fund crunch of the institution. Therefore it is suggested that pollution control board of west Bengal may be approached for installation of solar panel to provide alternative source of energy free of cost. IQAC has suggested improvement of the vermicompost plant for treatment of biological waste. Nonhazardous wastes, like dead plants, left over food from the canteen etc. are to be collected in a chamber for predecomposition by the help of microbes and worms. The vermicompost so produced may be used as manure or fertilizer for the college gardens. • NSS is to be asked to extend their activities and improve student particiation • IQAC has suggested to the principal that the Higher Education Minister may be approached to arrange the adjoining

field as a football ground for the college students. • Renovation of the main and annexe building and Relaying of the damaged floors of the class rooms and chemistry laboratories has been suggested.
