| <p>Barasat Government College, affiliated with West Bengal State University (WBSU), follows the university's prescribed syllabus for its undergraduate programs, which include multidisciplinary courses and the option of multiple entry and exit points for students. In addition to the core curriculum, the college offers value-added and add-on courses to address issues beyond the prescribed syllabus, including gender, human rights, ethics, and environmental awareness. Starting in the 2023-24 academic session, the college has implemented WBSU's NEP 2020 syllabus, which includes several multidisciplinary courses (MDCs). Each of the college's 13 departments offers skill enhancement and 10 add-on or value-added courses available to both Honours and General students. The IQAC, in collaboration with faculty members, is working to identify interdisciplinary aspects of the UG and PG syllabi, fostering a teaching approach that encourages lateral thinking and cross-disciplinary exchange of ideas. The college also offers computer courses (through DOEACC) and Environmental Studies to all students, enhancing their technical and ecological</p> | |

awareness. These courses aim to equip students with the necessary skills to become responsible, capable citizens. In addition, students can choose general electives that bridge the gap between science and humanities disciplines. Beyond academics, the college engages in community outreach through the NSS, which has adopted a local slum to conduct cleanliness drives and awareness programs. The Botany Department provides practical training in mushroom cultivation and bio-fertilizer use, which students share with local farmers, contributing to the community's agricultural development.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

According to NEP 2020, the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC), is a unique, lucid and student-centric system that has been introduced to facilitate the academic flexibility of the students to study in any Higher Education Institute in the country with an appropriate credit transfer mechanism from one programme to another. It revolutionizes the education system by providing immense mobility to the academic career of the students allowing them to surmount hindrances in real - time. Barasat Government College has already initiated the process of implementing ABC under the guidelines of West Bengal State University. A committee has been formed and the coordinator of the committee has participated in the training workshop conducted by the University regarding its modus operandi. To bring each and every student of the institution within the ambit of the ABC the opening of individual DigiLocker accounts for them is a pre-requisite. Different committee members have been assigned to mentor different sections of the students for opening their Digilocker accounts. The university has taken the responsibility to prepare the ABC for the students of our institution once their DigiLocker Accounts have been opened. It is expected that by the end of the current semester all students under NEP will be able to avail the benefit of ABC.

17.Skill development:

In the academic year 2023-24, the institution offered a variety of value-added courses to both honors and general (pass) students, enhancing their skills and preparing them for the competitive job market. Notable courses included: Quick Maths (Department of Mathematics) Fruit and Water Quality Analysis and Identification of Adulterants in Food (Department of Chemistry) Environmental Education and Sustainable Development (Geography) Know your Economy (Economics) India's Role in the World Today (Political Science) From Mushroom cultivation to Pest management

(Botany) The college follows the CBCS and NEP 2020 curricula of West Bengal State University, which include Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) across all disciplines. The college has also signed Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with organizations like Data Q and IIARI to provide soft skills and computer training. Several collaborative activities have been carried out with NGOs such as Swayam, Know Your Neighbour, and Purbasha Eco-Helpline Society to promote social skills and raise awareness about gender issues, local communities, and environmental concerns. Additionally, a faculty exchange program with 17 educational institutions has been established, providing students the opportunity to learn from external sources. To foster environment and gender equity values, the college offers courses such as Gender and Environmental studies. In addition, the college frequently conducts workshops on Yoga, Meditation, Stress Management, and Psychological Awareness to help students cope with daily challenges. The Science Club also helps to cultivate a scientific temperament among students and neighboring schoolchildren.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college offers courses under the CBCS and NEP syllabi of West Bengal State University, which integrate elements of traditional Indian Knowledge Systems. It provides UG Honours and General courses in Sanskrit and Bengali, as well as a PG course in Bengali, aiming to preserve and promote Indian languages. The English Honours syllabus includes papers on Classical Sanskrit Literature and incorporates translated texts from regional Indian languages, enhancing students' awareness of India's cultural heritage and diversity. Most classes are conducted bilingually (English and vernacular), making the content more accessible and fostering pride in students' mother tongues, thereby encouraging the use of vernaculars in higher education. The college regularly observes commemorative days such as Sanskrit Divas, Matribhasha Divas, and World Yoga Day to raise awareness about linguistic and cultural heritage. The college offers several value-added courses, including Cultural heritage of India, Bachik Shilpa pathshala all of which focus on Indian cultural heritage. Yoga courses, both as value-added and NSS initiatives, have also been organized to promote physical and emotional well-being, while introducing students to India's rich philosophical traditions. In preparation for the NEP curriculum, which emphasizes Indian Knowledge Systems, many faculty members have participated in NEP Sensitization Programmes organized by MMTTP. These programs have

provided faculty with valuable insights into Indian Knowledge Systems and pedagogical methods, which they will integrate into their teaching.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Barasat Government College offers sixteen UG programs and four PG programs, each with clearly defined Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for every paper. These outcomes are carefully crafted by the institute based on Bloom's Taxonomy and are available on the college website. While all UG programs are conducted under the academic framework of West Bengal State University, the PG programs have the flexibility to design their own curricula. In line with the CBCS and NEP course structure, student performance in each course is evaluated through a combination of internal assessments. Departments employ various innovative methods, such as quizzes, projects, classroom presentations, vivas, hands-on experiments, and lab notebook assessments, alongside traditional written tests. This approach promotes deeper student engagement with the course content and ensures continuous evaluation of their progress toward achieving the course outcomes. The results of internal assessments and student feedback collected through course outcome attainment questionnaires indicate that most students meet the course objectives. The college also identifies slow and advanced learners through a policy developed by the IQAC, providing necessary support for slower learners and encouraging advanced students. The effectiveness of these measures is evident in the end-of-semester result analysis, which shows that nearly 90% of UG and PG students (both university and college-designed exams) score above 60%. Additionally, around 30% of students from the college pursue higher studies after successfully competing in national entrance exams such as JAM, NET, and CUCET, further demonstrating the achievement of course outcomes.

20.Distance education/online education:

Our institution is an affiliated UG/PG college under West Bengal State University (WBSU), offering regular full-time courses approved by the University. Additionally, the college serves as a Study Centre for Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU) at the undergraduate level, providing B.A. and B.Sc. courses. This study centre is especially beneficial for students from remote rural areas, offering them access to distance education. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the college swiftly transitioned to online education to adapt to the lockdown, ensuring continuity in teaching and learning. After the resumption of offline classes,

the college has continued to integrate online learning with regular classes, enhancing the teaching process. Online sessions are held via platforms like Google Meet and Google Classroom, supported by tools such as OneNote, Google Jamboard, and Microsoft PowerPoint. Resources like YouTube videos and PHET simulations are shared with students through Google Drive. The college website hosts a dedicated section for study materials, allowing students easy access to various learning resources. Additionally, the institution has acquired Learning Management Software (LMS) to assist faculty members in creating and managing an online database of study materials, MCQs, and other resources, further streamlining the teaching and learning process.

Curriculum Planning: As a constituent college of West Bengal State University (WBSU), the curriculum follows WBSU guidelines and aligns with UGC's CBCS framework (2013) and NEP-2020. Faculty members, some of whom are part of WBSU's Board of Studies, contribute to curriculum development and modifications. The college offers 13 undergraduate Honors programs, 3 General courses, and 4 postgraduate programs across Science, Arts, and Humanities.

Curriculum Implementation: The Principal, IQAC, and Academic Sub-Committees oversee curriculum delivery. Departments create lesson plans, routines, and syllabus distributions aligned with WBSU's academic calendar. Interactive lectures, workshops, and ICT-enabled teaching methods, including G-Suite and YouTube, enhance learning. Innovative strategies such as group discussions, quizzes, and educational tours foster participative and experiential learning.

Collaborations through faculty exchange programs and MoUs with neighboring institutions and NGOs further enrich student experiences. The college ensures continuous evaluation of student performance through exams, assignments, and projects while monitoring faculty effectiveness based on teaching methodologies and engagement.

Outreach programs, including NSS activities like slum adoption, promote community engagement. Parent-Teacher Meetings encourage collaboration for student growth. The college regularly gathers feedback from stakeholders to assess and improve educational infrastructure and campus activities, with actions taken to address identified gaps. Feedback data is preserved for future reference, ensuring sustained academic and institutional development.

Barasat Government College employs a variety of methods to evaluate students' learning and knowledge acquisition, including class tests (written and viva-voce), internal university-mandated exams, end-semester exams, assignments, project work, and presentations. 2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Barasat Government College adopts student-centric approaches like experiential learning, participative learning, and problem-solving to enhance educational outcomes. Departments conduct weekly tests and internal assessments to track progress while offering participative learning opportunities through projects, presentations, webinars, wall magazines, e-magazines, film screenings, poster competitions, and quizzes.

Fieldwork and excursions, integral to participative and problem-solving learning, are regularly organized by science departments like Zoology, Botany, and Geography. This year, the Economics Department also arranged field visits to significant locations, enriching students' understanding of diverse cultures and geographical contexts while enhancing academic skills.

Responses :

Students are encouraged to leverage online platforms like Google Classroom, Google Jamboard, and YouTube for a modern, interactive learning experience.

The college's science club, Scientia, fosters interdisciplinary collaboration and innovation among science students. Activities include workshops on investigative experiments, interactions with high school students, visits to IISER Kolkata, and a science heritage walk, all aimed at cultivating scientific temperament and critical thinking.

Additionally, the college offered 10 value-added courses this year, bridging theoretical knowledge with practical skills and encouraging students to explore their interests beyond the curriculum.

Subject-specific commemorative days were observed through seminars, poster competitions, and cultural programs, deepening students' awareness of historical events, cultural heritage, and the natural world. These initiatives collectively promote academic excellence, critical thinking, and a well-rounded educational experience.

Teachers use different ICT-enabled tools on a regular basis.

Laptops, desktops, smart boards, writing pads and LCD projectors are used frequently. Video lectures, audio lectures, PowerPoint presentations, virtual labs, YouTube links, e-contents etc. are always used to conduct regular classes. When required teachers also use different meeting apps like Google Meet for taking online classes. We have several ICT-enabled classrooms in the college. Smart Classrooms are also being used. Several departments like Geography, Mathematics and others have well-equipped computer labs for curriculum delivery. Most of the departments have desktops or laptops to be used for effective teaching and learning. The Department of Geography has a GIS lab running successfully by the teachers and students of the department. Some of the science departments also carry out the practice of taking the teaching-learning process to new heights with the use of Google Classroom software. The language lab of the college with near about 20 computers has been used by the department of Bengali and English for language learning purposes. The Department of Economics partially uses the computer lab of Mathematics to guide students to use economic software and project preparation. Students use study materials uploaded to the college website on a regular basis.

Responses :

The Internal Assessment system of Barasat Government College is completely transparent. The Mode of internal assessment is mostly decided by the board of studies of respective subjects. It may be a written examination, project preparation, PowerPoint presentation etc. Following the published academic calendar of the parent University, WBSU, a centralized internal examination routine is finalized by the College Internal Examination Committee after a detailed discussion with the Principal, keeping in mind that the scheduled classes are not affected and that is circulated on the college website and college notice board on time. Teachers are given enough period to evaluate the answer scripts properly, and all marks of internal examination are uploaded to the university portal within due time and manner. The College authority also submits hard copies of marks of internal examination to the university office. For special cases where students can not appear for examination due to health issues or some other exigency, re-examinations are conducted after special permission from the principal. In addition to that, all departments continuously conduct class tests, viva voce, in-class presentations, home assignments, project preparations, group discussions debates etc. for internal assessment of students. Performances of students in all internal assessments are discussed with the students and It is also discussed with the parents in parent -teacher meeting for further betterment.

Barasat Government College developed a completely transparent mechanism to deal with internal examination-related grievances. The Internal Examinations Committee is constructed including

teacher members from the various departments which looks after the conduct of internal examination as a whole. All faculty members in our college maintain a cordial and student-friendly relationship in and out of the classroom and remain always approachable to students so that no student feels any hesitation to report his/her problems. To make the examination-related grievances redressal system time-bound and efficient several possible avenues remain open in our college. After the evaluation, most of the departments conduct a detailed discussion with the students regarding individual academic performance. If a student has any grievance regarding internal examination he/she can apply to the Principal through the Head of the Department or any faculty, the Internal Examination Committee, or the Students Grievances Redressal Committee of the college. He/She can report grievances in the Mentor mentee meeting of the college or Department. In all cases, grievances are sorted out in a time-bound manner. If needed, grievances are solved by negotiation with the parent university. For solving all grievances-related cases utmost priority is given to the interest of students and their prospects.

Barasat Government College currently offers 13 undergraduate departments and 4 postgraduate programs. In the 2023-24 academic year, the National Education Policy (NEP 2020) was successfully implemented for undergraduate Semesters I and II, while Semesters III to VI continue under the CBCS curriculum. All postgraduate programs—Zoology, Botany, Bengali (since 2019-20), and Physics (since 2021-22)—follow the CBCS system.

The institution has rigorously aligned its course outcomes (COs), program outcomes (POs), and program-specific outcomes (PSOs) with Bloom's Taxonomy, ensuring internationally recognized academic standards. The mapping of COs, POs, and PSOs, along with the articulation matrix, has been systematically developed and

implemented.

To ensure accessibility and understanding, these outcomes are widely circulated through:

1. **Website Display:** The COs, POs, PSOs, and articulation matrix are prominently displayed on the college website for easy access.
2. **Orientation Meetings:** At the start of each semester, departmental heads conduct teacher-student meetings to explain program and course outcomes. Faculty members provide detailed explanations during classroom teaching, encouraging students to explore these documents for a comprehensive understanding.
3. **Hard Copy Availability:** Printed copies of the outcomes and matrices are maintained in departmental offices and the library for reference.

Barasat Government College systematically evaluates the attainment of program outcomes (POs), program-specific outcomes (PSOs), and course outcomes (COs) through a structured methodology. This includes analyzing student performance data, feedback on courses and programs, and Academic Audit Reports. The correlation between student performance and expected outcomes is assessed via internal and end-semester examinations, project assignments, seminar

presentations, and viva-voce exams.

An annual internal academic audit is conducted by the College Academic Audit Committee, comprising senior faculty members and two external experts. This audit reviews students' progress, including academic results, attendance, assignments, and extracurricular activities, across all departments. A comprehensive Academic Audit Report is prepared and made available on the college website, along with recommendations for program and course enhancement.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has developed a software-based approach for calculating CO, PO, and PSO attainment levels. This course-specific evaluation employs two methods:

1. Direct Method: Attainment is calculated using marks from end-semester exams (two-thirds weightage) and internal assessments (one-third weightage).
2. Indirect Method: A Google Forms survey is conducted among students who have completed the course, gathering feedback on their satisfaction with course outcomes.

The overall attainment level for a course is a composite of both direct and indirect methods. Based on the findings, departments take necessary measures to improve academic programs, ensuring alignment with educational objectives and enhancing student learning experiences.

For instance, the Sanskrit Department hosted an online lecture on Vedic deities to explore cultural insights, while the Bengali Department organized a youth convention in collaboration with Ramakrishna Math to promote Swami Vivekananda's philosophy of "Man Making Education," encouraging spiritual and moral growth.

These initiatives not only inspire students to pursue higher education and research but also contribute to their holistic development, uniquely preparing them for contemporary challenges in the Indian higher education landscape.

3.4 - Extension Activities

3.4.1 - Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the year

The college has organized various extension activities to foster community engagement and sensitize students to societal needs,

promoting their holistic development.

The NSS unit has conducted initiatives such as blood donation camps, World Environment Day celebrations, and HIV/AIDS awareness programs. These activities equipped students with knowledge on preventing diseases like dengue, malaria, and chikungunya, as well as promoting sanitation, waste management, and environmental conservation.

Field visits, lab tours, and excursions enhanced research ideas and soft skills, while mushroom cultivation training empowered students with entrepreneurial and self-employment skills. The Botany Department maintains a herbal garden to preserve medicinal plants and promote socio-economic growth, while the Zoology Department's vermicomposting unit, active since 2018, educates students on recycling and composting through hands-on learning.

The incubation center organized workshops on entrepreneurship, covering crafts, painting, jewelry making, baking, and mushroom culture. The Students' Support and Welfare Cell organized a dengue awareness campaign, including a walk with banners, to highlight disease prevention and its societal impact.

Collaborative career counseling and lab visits for school students under a cluster approach initiative enriched the academic ecosystem. The Science Club organized lab visits for schools, while World Cancer Day 2024 was marked with a poster competition to spread awareness about cancer prevention.

These activities have significantly boosted students' leadership skills, confidence, and community relationships, while uncovering latent talents and fostering awareness of societal challenges.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Barasat Government College, spanning 9259.09 square meters (2.28797 acres), is well-equipped to deliver quality education at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels. At the undergraduate level, the college offers 13 Honours courses and 3 program courses, while the postgraduate level includes 4 PG courses in Physics, Botany, Zoology, and Bengali. The institution provides ample opportunities for career development and regular career counseling activities, preparing students for successful entry into the job market.

The college infrastructure includes three main buildings, housing academic departments and administrative offices. There are 19 ICT-enabled classrooms dedicated to teaching, along with state-of-the-art laboratories for science and language studies. Notable equipment includes a double-beam UV spectrophotometer, rotary evaporator, and gel documentation unit, which support both current academic requirements and advanced research initiatives.

Barasat Government College ensures seamless integration of technology in education with a significant number of computers and Wi-Fi-enabled internet access. Additionally, each department is equipped with modern computer laboratories to effectively conduct the curriculum.

The college celebrates numerous commemorative events throughout the year and organizes annual sports events between January and February. Students also have access to a well-equipped gymnasium with a professional trainer, free of charge.

A dedicated Students' Union Room supports the apolitical student committee in hosting cultural and social activities. Additional student-focused facilities include computer training through DATA-Q and NIELIT-accredited programs, NSS activities, medical welfare and psychological counseling, a sickroom, an anti-ragging cell, an alumni association, a medicinal plant garden, CCTV surveillance, ramps for physically challenged individuals, a canteen, and solar power panels.

- **E-Resources:** The library holds an Inflibnet N-List membership for e-journals, with an annual renewal fee of ₹5,900. This ensures continuous access to a wide array of electronic resources.
- **Transparency in Resource Management:** Annual expenditures on books and journals are meticulously recorded, maintaining transparency in resource allocation and usage.
- **Preservation of Rare Articles:** Efforts are underway to preserve rare books and other valuable materials within the library. This initiative aims to enhance accessibility and benefit knowledge seekers within and beyond the institution.

With its rich collection and modernized services, the library remains a cornerstone of academic excellence and innovation.

Two primary bodies oversee these audits:

1. **Audit General (AG), Bengal:** A statutory body responsible for auditing the financial statements and transactions of state-run institutions in Bengal. The AG ensures transparency, accountability, and the proper use of public funds.
2. **Higher Education Department (HED), Government of West Bengal:** Supervising higher education institutions in the state, the HED ensures that financial practices align with state policies and educational objectives.

This dual-layered auditing process reflects the College's dedication to financial integrity and compliance with both state and central government standards, fostering public trust and accountability.

Additionally, while adhering to these procedures, the College may also engage authorized private agencies to conduct financial audits. In this instance, the College has utilized a private agency to prepare and conduct the financial audit, which has been uploaded under this metric.

The following norms have been set up by the IQAC to assess learning outcomes of the college:

1. A regular online feedback is collected from students and guardians of each semester regarding the infrastructural facilities of the college. The feedback is analyzed by the IQAC and remedial steps are taken to address the problems faced by the students.
2. Each department also collects online student's feedback on the performance of teachers on various issues like syllabus coverage, interactivity, knowledge sharing, audibility etc. The collected data is examined by the IQAC and shared with the teachers to ensure better performance in future.

- **Solid Wastes** are collected separately in bins marked in different colour codes for paper, bio -degradable (food items, leaf litter etc.) and non - bio degradable (dismantled building materials, plastics etc.). They are then separately collected by the Barasat Municipality as per the MoU signed by the College.
- **Hazardous chemicals waste management:** To reduce the volume of chemical waste generated in the laboratories the following initiatives have been taken: a) Purchase of minimum possible quantity of hazardous chemicals required for our laboratories. b) Sharing surplus chemicals with other laboratories of biological sciences. c) Practicing green chemistry i.e. substituting hazardous chemicals with nonhazardous chemicals whenever possible. d) Reducing the scale of laboratory experiments to reduce the volume of wastes being produced. e) Specially constructed Waste Accumulation Area (WAA) outside the Department of Chemistry to dispose the liquid waste, produced from the experiments conducted through pipelines to the WAA.
- **E-waste management:** The College has successfully disposed of e-waste through Webel Technology Limited. An e-waste management committee comprising of senior teachers organized the disposal by the help of the heads of each department.

Barasat has served as a seedbed of women's education in Bengal during the nineteenth century with the setting up of the first private school for girls in India in 1847 by Kalikrishna Mitra. Carrying forward this legacy of women's education the college can boast of a student community in which the ratio of women students has consistently been more than half of the total student strength. More importantly, the representation of women from marginalized sections and the minority communities is as high as 60 percent and 20 percent of the total number of women students respectively. The reason for attracting huge number of girls students are as follows:
