The UG departments of the institution follow the syllabus and guidelines of the affiliating university. Several teachers are members of the Undergraduate Board of Studies, where they actively contribute in the university's curriculum forming process. The PG departments have academic autonomy. They frame their syllabus, with advice from subject experts, which are subsequently approved by the PG BOS. The PG syllabus is included in the PG prospectus. The Institution has upgraded itself to cope with the demands of the changing syllabi. It uses supports of smart classrooms, ICTs, audio-visual material available on the internet to make a successful implementation of the curriculum. Student seminars and discussion sessions are organised to further the objective of improved communication of the syllabus. Resource persons are also invited to

deliver talks and lectures. All activities of the institution are continually documented through photographs of the events, records of attendance in classes and extracurricular activities. These records are preserved by respective departments and committees. The departments also preserve projects and presentations as part of the documentation. Notices are published in the general notice book, notice board and the website to inform all stake-holders about an event. They also form a part of the documentation of an event/activity.

Feedback Obtained

1) Regular feedbacks are taken from students by the departments. The feedback is read by all the teachers of the department. Thereafter the feedback is centrally analysed and addressed (or redressed). 2) Teachers' council meetings must be regarded as a well documented feedback taking platform. Teachers both give and resolve issues in these meetings about every academic activity. 3) Since ours is a government institution, the institution submits regular reports to the government about all its activities and its functions according to government rules and instruction. The Government send its nominees and representatives to procure further information, if so required. 4) The college has a strong and effective alumnus. Some of the regular teachers being alumnimembers act as liaisonofficers exchanging information between the alumnus and the institution. 5) The departments also organise ParentTeacher meetings. These meetings are very effective platforms for teachers to give their feedbacks to the parents about their wards and the facilities that are enjoyed by students in this college. Parents also give their feedbacks to the teachers. These feedbacks are always treated as highpriority. 6) An online feedback system is available for students and parents via the college website.

A number of methods are in place for mentoring students in this institute. The majority of students of this institute come from lower middle class or economically poor households. Many of them are 1st generation learners with no academic environment at home. Keeping this backdrop in mind, the institute has devised different systems to cater for the academic and overall development of the student. Each department holds regular tutorial classes (at least 4 per week). Remedial classes are also held for socially and economically vulnerable students after college hours though UGC funds for such classes were discontinued. To give mental support of students a psychological counselling cell of the institution is active. Awareness programs and workshops are held regularly aimed at personality development and gender sensitization. To enhance speaking and presentation skills of students Student seminars/ class room seminars are also organized. Field based subjects organizes regular field study to integrate theoretical classroom knowledge with experience gained in the field.

This college being a government college of the state of west Bengal, its physical maintenance, mainly maintaining the buildings of the college is entrusted with the PWD (Civil and Electrical) of the government. However other than building, the maintenance and utilization of academic and physical facilities, the Higher Education Department, Govt. Of West Bengal disbursed funds during 201819 and the college authorities spends the fund on priority basis. For the academic facilities it spends money on maintenance of copier machines, computers and microscopes of different departments. Wifi maintenance is also under the purview of academic facilities for providing uninterrupted internet facilities to teachers and students of the college. So far as physical facilities are concerned the college maintains water purifier machines, soundless generator and gardens for beautification and environmental purpose.

Curriculum Development

The College is affiliated to West Bengal State University currently, for the undergraduate courses. The new CBCS system for UG has been implemented by the university from this academic year. The University has arranged several workshops and meetings to frame the syllabus for this new system. Faculty members of all departments have participated in the workshops and helped to design the new curriculum. Moreover several faculty members of our college belong to the UG and PG board of studies and hence play an active role in syllabus designing. In the Postgraduate departments there is scope under the present system to function outside the purview of the affiliating university. The main salient feature of syllabi of all P.G. departments is to include dissertation, presentation in the part of the core curricula encouraging the mastering of research and analytic writing skills. The entire PG syllabus is remodelled biennially in PG Board of Studies meeting, whereby all recent developments in the discipline are incorporated in the PG syllabus.

Teaching and Learning

ICT enabled teachinglearning process is encouraged. ? Filmshows, Quiz etc. related to curricula are organised by all the departments. ? Interactive teachinglearning process is adopted. ? Educational excursions are conducted by some departments. ? The post graduate department provides ample infrastructure for pursuing research work on different specialized branches. The assembly of carefully chosen instruments often combined with analytical software in different laboratories assure training and accessibility to a wide range of pupils from undergraduate level to researchers. ? 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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

a. Efforts for Carbon neutrality ? Using Air conditioners at a fixed higher mode in order to reduce greenhouse gases and thereby mitigate climate change. ? Judicious use of electricity in the campus by sensitizing the stakeholders. ? Use of renewable Energy in the form of installation of solar panel photovoltaic system that will result in the reduction of carbon at the college premises. ? Judicious use of Natural Gas by the Departments of Chemistry and Biological Sciences results in minimum purchase of natural gas

b. Plantation: Tree Plantation programme is held annually by the NSS Unit. The Department of Botany maintains a Medicinal Plant Garden in the college.

c. Vermitechnology Unit Barasat Govt. College has one vermicompost unit at the adjacent garden area. Vermicompost is prepared with various forms of biodegradable wastes with the help of earthworms. The earthworms eat the organic residues, digest it and excrete in the form of pellets. The earthworm excreta called worm cast which is vermicompost. We have followed Pit method which is commonly used for small scale production of vermicompost. This compost is used in the horticulture and medicinal garden of the college. Vermicompost is a nutrient rich compost which helps better plant growth and crop yield and improves physical structure of soil and increase water holding capacity of soil. The deepburrowing earthworms already present in the soil which indirectly improves fertility of soil. It improves root growth of plants and enhances germination, plant growth, and crop yield.

d. Preventive measures for fighting Dengue and Chikungunya The NSSunit of the College arranged for awareness programmes and drives for campus cleaning and spreading bleaching powder to prevent mosquito propagation on 25th27th, April, 2019.

e. Hazardous waste management: Care is taken to eliminate the production of hazardous waste or minimize the amount of waste for disposal by recycling, reusing and/or recovering the waste, by the departments of chemistry and biological sciences. To reduce the volume of chemical waste generated in the laboratories the following initiatives have been taken: a) Purchase of smallest quantity of hazardous chemicals required for our laboratories. b) Sharing surplus chemicals with other laboratories of biological sciences. c) Purchase of mercuryfree instruments. d) Substituting hazardous chemicals with nonhazardous chemicals whenever possible. e) Reducing the scale of laboratory experiments to reduce the volume of wastes being produced as and when possible. Apart from these, we have specially constructed a Waste Accumulation Area (WAA) outside the Department of Chemistry to dispose the waste. The waste is passed through a pipeline to the WAA. Some dismantled building materials or canteen waste are collected in the Vat for clearance by the local municipality

Best Practice I Title of the Practice: A comprehensive student management

system handling all aspects of student data. Objective: A web based ERP application to manage all aspects of student, Staff and Management. It is hosted in cloud server thus allowing to access information at any point of time using any internet enabled devices. The cloud application allows linking any payment gateway or bank to manage any kind of financial transaction from the student end for their respective fees payment. The cloud application can be integrated with the SMS and Email server for sending various kinds of SMS and Email alerts. Context: (i) The new CBCS system requires handling of a huge amount of data related to student attendance, internal exam marks etc. Hence a new comprehensive management system which can handle data in a specified format and can be accessed by all departments of the college was necessary. (ii) With the increase in online systems like admission, results, scholarships etc., student require a website which can be accessed from any internet enabled device at any time, and provide all facilities under one umbrella. (iii) All financial transactions, like fees payment, scholarship transactions etc. needs to be maintained online for the benefit of the students. Practice and implementation: The program has been introduced from July 2018 and has been running successfully over the last year. Highlights of the student management system: • Data can be accessed from anywhere. • No big IT infrastructure needed. • Highly secured data with daily auto back up facility. • Online Offline Payment Facilities. • SMS and Email alert at every possible juncture for security and mass information. Recycling waste for ornamental purposes Objectives: To equip students of diverse backgrounds to face the environmental and social challenges of present times Context: • Barasat Government College is located in the district headquarters of North 24 Parganas. Many students come from the rural or semiurban areas. There is a high rate of enrolment of students of under privileged sections of society, mostly from the SC, ST, OBC and Minority community. • The students, being mainly first generation learners, are generally unaware of the job prospects that are open to them. Their family members usually work in agricultural sector or are engaged in manual labour. So the students have no idea about the alternative avenues that are lying unexplored. • Since the students come from the economically weaker section of the society, they have no exposure to the banking system. • Due to the rapid urbanization in the country, there are accompanying environmental hazards. The students have to be made environmentally sensitive. They also need to be acquainted with the threat posed by the vectors. • For their overall development the students need to be aware of the menace of drug addiction and the rapid spread of AIDS. Besides they should also know the skills of selfdefence to protect themselves. Practice and Implementation: • On 24.04.2019 Dr. Prantosh K. Paul, Executive Director, MSCIS Department of Computer and Information Science, Raiganj University briefed the students on Information Technology and its fields. He also spoke about some relevant schemes. • Dr. Pranam Dhar, Programme Coordinator, NSS, West Bengal State University delivered a talk on 29.04.2019 on banking literacy. • On 24.04.2019 Dr. Chandan Surabhi

Das, Assistant Professor, Department of Geography discussed global warming and its adverse effects. • Dr. Jayati Ghosh, Associate Professor, Department of Zoology delivered a lecture on vector borne diseases on 25.04.2019. Students distributed leaflets in the neighbourhood to spread awareness of these diseases. They also cleaned the college campus and spread bleaching powder to keep the area free of vectors. • On 26.04.2019 Mr. Subrata Biswas, Special Excise Commissioner, delivered a lecture on drug addiction. Owing to its geographical location in the communication network, ambiance, glorious records, remarkable results and achievements, the college attracts the best brains of the locality students from a wide area and from a varied socioeconomic background. A good number of students of this college come from the rural or semiurban areas. The high rate of enrolment of students of under privileged sections of society, mostly from the SC, ST, OBC and Minority community is also a significant factor. The ratio of the girl students of the college is also noticeably high. Following the ideals of inclusive education, we are committed to look after the needs of the larger society, including students from this disadvantaged class, who are meritorious but lack the means. So our mission is to prove that even a first generation learner can reach the heights if given proper opportunities, right facilities and guidance. With reference to the above table it is apparent that the ratio of female students in this college is very high and is steadily increasing over the years. Majority of them belong to financially as well as socially backward classes. A large section of them belong to Muslim minority group. Encouraging these students to pursue higher education and motivating them to continue with their studies braving social odds proves a challenge to the institution. A number of steps have been devised focussing on the female students of this college: (i) A variety of financial scholarships like Kanyashree (a state government scholarship), single girl child scholarship (central govt.), poor fund, half free and full free scholarships are provided to the students through the scholarship committee of the college. The college has temporarily recruited 2 staff members to provide assistance to the girl students regarding this matter. (ii) A strong ICC and gender cell, which addresses the various gender related issues, functions in the college. The committees regularly arrange

gender sensitization programs to raise awareness on various social issues relating to women. (iii) A fully functional psychological counselling cell operates in the institute providing support and guidance to the female students.
